


Carino's Corner - September 2005


CARINO'S CORNER DECEMBER 2005



. CDS AND DVDS FOR BACKUP & STORAGE

As many of you may or may not know, there are no real life tests to compare the manufacturers' claims to. Although it is commonly held that 5 to 10 years is the life expectancy, I wouldn't hold a great deal of stock in that. The amount of time that a media disk may last is governed by a great many factors. In no particular order, I am going to list the many factors that can dictate the life of a disk. You get what you pay for. Cheaper disks have a higher failure rate. It is not uncommon to get a spindle of 100 blank CDs and have upwards of 10 of them that won't work (for cheap disks). Get a good brand name. I have some disks that are 8 years old now and are working fine. I have had disks that were 4 years old fail on me. Believe it or not, burn speed is important!!! The slower you burn something, the better quality the burn will be, and the longer it is likely to last. As you all know, there are writeable disks (R) that you burn data to once and they cannot be used again. re-writeable (RW) can be used over and over. Two problems with Re-writeables though.



ONE. In order to see the data in any other machine, you must "lock" the disk with the machine that created it. If you don't, you will be out of luck if you lose or bust the machine that created it.

TWO. Re-writeables by their very nature will not live as long as writeable only. The top of the disk, or the label side is the important side!! I see so many people carry a disk and are so careful to protect the bottom side because they mistakenly believe that is where the data is. Although it is important to keep the bottom scratch free, if you get a scratch, at least you won't lose your data. The "plastic" of the disk acts as a lens and a medium. The data is actually collected on the bottom side of the label or "paint" on the CD. Scratch that label or paint and your data is toast.

If you choose to use disk media for long term backup and storage, I suggest you go out and buy a DVD player to store with it. I get so many different types of tapes, disks, etc. to recover because the client no longer has anything to read the media with. I would suggest that hard drives are a better long term storage device. Their drawback though, is that they are mechanical and have moving parts that could fail. Stiction is a rare problem with hard drives that haven't seen use in a while. This is where the spindle seizes up due to the hardening of the lubrication in the motor. Usually a good whack will fix it, but.....




CARINO'S CORNER DECEMBER 2006




CARINO'S CORNER DECEMBER 2007

Quite a few in attendance contributed to a fund for providing extant care and services to the veterans and their families. In November 2007 I participated in Bereavement and Memorial Ceremony at the Philadelphia Veteran Administrations (VA) Hospital held for the families who had a loved one hospitalized and who passed on during 2007. The Memorial Ceremony and its following reception gave me a firsthand opportunity to witness our contributions in action. The Ceremony itself included words of greeting and welcome from the VA Chaplin, a career army speed forces retiree (with extensive involvement in

counterintelligence/counterinsurgency) turned Chaplin and a last call of the deceased as an integral part of the service. The Ceremony was heart warming and heart felt. CARINO'S CORNER DECEMBER 2008

Recently in discussing another matter with an Attorney our conversation drifted into the subject of business development and marketing. I mentioned that my favorite marketing "tool" was serving as a presenter at various business and professional groups and bringing as a handout out something relevant to the core business of the attendees - something the attendees would be likely to retain for future reference/retrieval (this would eliminate business cards or company brochures as the prime handout material). The Attorney agreed and then focused attention on what he uses as his measuring stick to accept an individual as a business client. He mentioned six points in his evaluation as necessary steps to establish a viable and acceptable business relationship as follows: The potential client has to "know" you. We have frequently heard that initial impressions can be lasting impressions so getting off on the right foot is essential. Secondly, the client needs to like you. If there are options no one likes to do business with a difficult person. His third point was the client needs to respect you, both personally and professionally. This leads to his fourth and fifth points - the need to project the appearance and reality of being ethically sound and legally compliant in the manner in which you conduct yourself in with regard to the matter at hand. Assuming you and your client score high in what should be a mutual evaluation, the sixth point is yours to make before you "close the deal" - that is an assessment on the client's ability to pay. How often do you run a reality check on a potential client in advance? It seems to me that these "standards" as a tool to assess a potential client are worthwhile for us to add to our arsenal of available techniques. Obviously, it should replace a due diligence but it does add a human factor element.






CARINO'S CORNER DECEMBER 2011

(As you will note, the spelling of Intellenet has changed since this article ran. There's a history to that story, not told here ...)



Jim Carino -Living His Life's Work

"The problem with doing nothing is not knowing when you are finished."

"There are two types of people in this world. It's either us or them. Us is everyone connected with law enforcement, investigations, military intelligence, special investigations, etc. Them is everyone else." That's what Jim Carino has to say about his world. He's a man who lives by his convictions.

This unassuming, dignified gentleman is a living-breathing example of a professional committed to doing what he knows best. He's former Director of Criminal Investigations, Air Force Office of Special Investigations with command experience on both U.S. and foreign soil. With several decades of military and civilian experience, he's a man on the move who thrives on getting the job done. For the last twenty years he has served as head of Executive Security Consultants (ESC) specializing in conducting security surveys, training and major investigations for an impressive clientele. Still very active in his business and frequently appearing as an expert witness in complex civil litigation cases, Carino just can't seem to keep his fingers out of several other pies.

For example, he is currently serving as President of the Pennsylvania Association of Licensed Investigators (PALI), is on the board of the National Council of Investigative and Security Services (NCISS) and a member of the Vidocq Society, an association based in Philadelphia that specializes in solving cold cases. That's in addition to being founder and executive director of one of the world's most prestigious private association of investigative and security specialists, the International Intelligence Network (INTELNET). But that's a whole story unto itself.

INTELNET has the auspicious privilege of being host to approximately 350 members worldwide. INTELNET members are handpicked by Jim Carino to fulfill a need for exceptional investigative talent in prime geographic locations. The goal of this rather unique association is to bring together the brightest, most experienced and established investigators and security consultants in the world to network their ideas, information and services. INTELNET started with a core group of 25 people from OSI backgrounds who were all retired and working in the private sector. Carino realized early on that the work demands of the "real world" differed dramatically from the rank and file of military intelligence and criminal investigations. The rules were different on the streets stateside than they were in Italy, where he was based for so many years. He was intelligent enough to know what he didn't know. He was also smart enough to understand that he was not flying solo on this trip. So he brought together these former military types who were engaged in a second profession. By helping each other, sharing ideas and filling in the blanks for one another, they were all soon at the top of their game. What better staff to boast than 25 former intelligence and investigative agents with knowledge of everything from security to counter-terrorism. And the INTELNET family has grown considerably.

The makeup of INTELNET has expanded with the organization. Members with backgrounds from other military and government intelligence agencies soon swelled the ranks. They were followed by investigators representing a huge variety of disciplines. A pre-

-requisite of ten years experience in the investigative field insures that members have mastered the art of running and maintaining their own investigative businesses. INTELNET now boasts one of the most brilliant mind-trusts of talent ever assembled.

Carino understands the value of sharing. "Far too often I hear investigators complaining that they don't want to go to meetings or seminars because 'someone will steal' their clients." He quips, "These

are the same people who never learn, never get business and starve to death." He is ecstatic when he proclaims that he has multiplied his value 350-fold because of his IN-TELNET concept. That's 350 times more brainpower, more resources and more connections for future work, IN-TELNET seminars -held at locations

around the world -- boast an average of one-third membership turnout. That in itself is incredible in a world where it's difficult to get 50 investigators together for a state seminar.

There is a dignity about Jim Carino that is apparent the moment he walks into a room. He has a commanding presence that no doubt dates back to his stint as an accredited instructor at Alvernia College at Andrews Air Force Base in Washington, D.C. teaching OSI tactics. He's like a magnet that attracts people by his very presence. Ten minutes after entering a cocktail party at a seminar he is surrounded by friends, colleagues and those who wish to be. Carino never gets loud, never makes demands, but firmly and confidently controls every discussion in which he participates.

Who would have thought that this dynamic individual wanted to be a garbage man at age three? Or that

his early interest in cowboys and crime movies would propel him to become such a patriot and protector of our rights. He jokes that if he had had enough talent, he was truly destined to be a professional trombone player. Although he sat first chair throughout his school days, including college, and was a member of both dancing and marching bands, he recognized the limits of his musical talent in enough time to provide the rest of us with some sorely needed leadership.

At heart he's just a family man who still loves his wife Connie with fierce intensity after several decades of marriage. He boasts of her accomplishments before he will even mention his own. These accomplishments are nothing to ignore. Connie Carino is Clinical Director of Psychiatric Nursing for the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania. She is the recipi-

ent of the most coveted Gimbel Award (1996) following in the footsteps of the likes of Eleanor Roosevelt and Amelia Erhart. She is also the mother

of their son and daughter and shares grand parenting rights with Jim for four fabulous children. In short, she's a match for the wit, intelligence and accomplishments of her well traveled and super experienced mate.

Carino has learned to "turn it off" when he needs to. In spite of juggling four offices of responsibility with investigative associations and running a very lucrative business, he still finds time to sit on his deck at the Jersey shore and enjoy the sights and sounds of the aviary population in the bird sanctuary next door. It's a calming respite that is well earned. Someone once asked him what he did for a hobby. To Jim Carino, life is a hobby and he enjoys it all.



The Board Accredited Investigator Program (BAI)

Reggie Montgomery, BAI and Harvey Morse, BAI

The Florida Association of Private Investigators, Inc. is pleased to announce that its members and those of other associations and groups will be given the opportunity to earn the designation known as "BAI" (Board Accredited Investigator). Upon the submission of a white paper on any legitimate investigative subject -- which will be reviewed and most likely later published into a syllabus for research, protocol and teaching new licensees -- the designation will be awarded.

In an effort to continue to enhance the quality of the investigative services offered by our members through voluntary continuing

education, the retention of the designation will require attending conferences and trainings, while the white paper submission will only be required

for the initial acquisition of the designation. If a member is unable to be present at a convention, seminar or training, credit will be given by attending seminars sponsored by other associations, which have been approved by BAI, and/or online training and examination offered by BAI.

At the present time, the Council of Association Leaders (COAL), which is comprised of officers (past and present) of many investigative organizations across the United States and elsewhere, is considering taking over this program under its auspices, and will most likely set an initial requirement of being actively licensed for 15 years or be a past or present officer in a recognized investigative organization. However, since this was a FAPI concept approved by its membership over two years ago, COAL recognized that FAPI will run with the program for now, work out the kinks and details and have a viable designation package should they wish to carry on.

We anticipate that there will be many benefits of attaining the designation. It may not be for everyone and that is why it is voluntary. For those who do become BAI's, we are instituting some of the following:

- Special training and events during the year for BAI members only;
- Discounts at various functions, conventions, trainings and seminars;
- A Certificate of Membership;
- A BAI email listserve;
- Promotional advertising such as: "Need a Private Investigator? Look for the BAI designation";
- Welcome events and recognition at other association meetings;
- The right to use the designation after one's name and in websites, advertising, and printed literature.

These are just a few of the ideas being discussed right now.

Initially, the BAI will be overseen by a governing board, but is initially being chaired by Reggie Montgomery and Harvey Morse. It will have

its own guidelines, which will be developed by its board and BAI members. We will need volunteers to assist with writing questions for the online exam. We anticipate about six categories and a pool of 25 questions in each. When accessing the exam, fifty questions will be randomly generated, equally from each category. We have been experimenting with the testing system, which is already in use by many Fortune 500 companies.

It is important for you to know that this is a work in progress. It is important and difficult work to make us better at what we do, and to establish a syllabus to help those experienced investigators as well as the newly licensed.

As of this writing, there are approximately 45 BAI members, with many being from Intellenet, and membership benefits already exist in the form of discounted training, private sessions with instructors, the membership certificate, press release and email list!

Carino's Column

AN INCOMPLETE HISTORY OF INTELLENET

THE BEGINNING

In the fall of 1982 my company, Executive Security Consultants (ESC), was invited to submit a proposal for the conduct of background investigations under contract with a major electric power company located in the mid Atlantic states. The invite was suggested by the company's Director of Security, a retired Air Force Special Agent whom I was acquainted with as a result of private sector interface. Oddly, this individual was not part of the decision making process.

Proposal preparation was highly suggestive of a visit. Early on I asked the question as to whether the selectee would be the low bidder and the response was "not necessarily." Buoyed by this non-negative response we discussed further the scope of the project as there was no formal Request For Proposal (RFP)/bid specs to be issued by the power company. Basically, the scope covered all of the 50 states except for the 100 miles radius of corporate headquarters. Those BIs would be conducted by in-house personnel.

Armed with the pertinent information necessary and faced with the formidable task of locating and recruiting in all 50 states contact was made initially with 25 former or retired AFOSI special agents located in 17 states with whom I was maintaining informal contacts. This was a small group to meet the scope but a start. Each was queried for interest (each was in the private sector investigative business) and each was solicited to additional PIs. Of course, this was done by letter and telephone as the internet was not yet up and running. All, were enthusiastic about the opportunity. While the number interested in participating increased somewhat we were still perhaps lacking sufficient US coverage.

A proposal was submitted and shortly thereafter the contract award was made. I note that at the conclusion of my initial visit I was asked why I raised the question about low bid. I responded that I would undoubtedly not be low bid but I could well be the low effective bid as the team I would put together would be professional investigators skilled and schooled in the conduct of background investigations and turn out a comprehensive and professional BI in less time, thereby being more cost efficient. The rather quick announce-

ment of the selected bidder indicated the contractor had been pre-determined and additional proposals were solicited only to meet a minimum quota of three. Of course, a factor would also have been a lack of adequate coverage, a point I attempted to minimize in the proposal. The selectee was the low bidder. However, had they told me the determining factor would be the low bidder, as I stated to them I would have thanked them for considering me but broken off the meeting before it started and there never would have been an Intelnet. When I advised the 25 I was not the successful bidder I suggested this could be the start of something and asked if they had interest in forming a group of investigators. All replied positive and additional new names for members started to flow in – slowly at first. Also, investigative requests for assistance between and among the invited group began to flow and the association, to be officially named Intelnet (the Intelligence Network) was born in early 1983. The initial name OSINET was rather quickly discussed as it was recognized that a "mirror image" of AFOSI globally could never be attained by using only OSI personnel. (NOTE: The name change to Intellenet in 2007 will be discussed later.)

THE VISION

From the outset, Intelnet's vision was to form a worldwide network of private investigators & security professionals, modeled after the Air Force OSI organizational structure of offices throughout the world (where US Air Force interests existed). In essence by sending out "undeveloped leads" (i.e. requests for investigation support & assistance), a network, all former or retired OSI special agents similarly vetted,- cont. page 4

trained, and experienced would exist to support one another while still functioning as individual entrepreneurs. Unfortunately, many of those original 25 are now deceased. Emphasis was placed on forming a sole source network as purely an entity to provide professional investigative and security services to the private sector.

THE EARLY YEARS

Growth was slow initially and it became quickly obvious that a network, as stated above, exclusively consisting of former OSI agents could never successfully meet a global reach. Recruitment was expanded to include emphasis on other former federal special agents and select private sector investigative personnel lacking public sector experience but vouched for by fellow members. By late 1985 membership was at 64 members in 33 states with an additional 9 states being covered by "on call" capability and 8 additional specialized skills personnel (TSCM, polygraph, etc.). Absent, however, was international coverage. During this period the first Intelnet Newsletter was published and a consolidated roster was provided all members. During these formative first 3 years there were no annual dues as ESC funded and covered all expenses.

1986 was the year Intelnet began to come of age, with several significant steps taken to ensure sustainability, recognition and growth. The slow but steady growth and the quarterly mailing of a newsletter served as catalysts to spark additional names for membership. It also became apparent that ESC could no longer afford total funding of the network, leading to the introduction of dues, set at \$15 per year primarily to cover mail costs. Intelnet also experienced its first dropout, a member who thought dues payments of \$15 was exhorbitant since he had not received any billable time during his two years of membership. When I asked how many members he had used on a billable time basis he abruptly hung up on me causing a forever end of our relationship.

1986 was also the year Intelnet was officially registered as a corporate entity. Efforts to be approved as a non-profit entity were denied, thus the formation of a Sub chapter "S" corporation. The availability of the internet also brought about significant change. Members could now communicate quickly, exchanging requests for assistance, establishing websites as well as the exchange of ideas on a real time basis. Also, one day a full loaded computer, courtesy of Dave Parker arrived at my front door. Dave also designed our first website that year. Dave's brother Bill, a very active early member, gave me my first computer use tutorial. (Bill's nephew and Dave's son David is now a member)

Also in 1986 the first Board meeting was held, in Chicago. With local arrangements made by Tom Hampson (since retired but still on the Listserve), other attendees were Brad Penny (d. 2007), Bob Godman (d. 1996), Gary Brown (d. 2012), and Bill Parker. All voluntarily of us paid our own air, hotel, meals and other incidental expenses since there was not yet a fully funded treasury established. Unfortunately, minutes were not kept so no official record exists as to actual discussions or policy decisions. Undoubtedly, the establishment of a formal structure, membership growth, billable opportunities were on the agenda and the first Board was appointed. In addition to the attendees, the Board also included Bill Parker and undoubtedly others whose names are no longer recalled.

1986, possibly as an outgrowth of that initial Board meeting, also saw the implementation of several successful expansion steps. Many of our members were subcontractors for ARAMCO in their conduct of background investigations. Retired OSI special agent Ray Jungers (deceased) who I knew quite well from active duty days headed up the security department thereat. To further expand his investigative pool we exchanged membership lists, resulting in a number of his subcontractor investigators joining Intelnet. This was also our first initiative though one did not use that term back then. Also that year, member Horace Cavitt, based in El Paso TX had a group former GS 1811 investigators he was using to service a government background investigations contract. Through him invites were sent out to his team resulting in additional growth. Several of our former GS 1811's also joined his group.

The last significant growth step of 1986 was taken when Intelnet and an association called Assets 2000 headed by Denis Read established a working relationship. Assets 2000, primarily a European group but also with a few members scattered throughout Asia gave Intelnet its first entry into the international arena. Essentially, Denis is served as the contact points to set forth requests for investigative assistance between the two groups. Circa 1988-89 Read opted to retire and Intelnet offered full membership to all Asset 2000 personnel desiring to affiliate. All but one took advantage of the opportunity.

served. Catch me at an Intellenet Hospitality Suite and I will be more than glad to relate some of his tales which are legendary. Several old timers will remember that Brad Penny who served with me at Aviano AB Italy 1961-64, was my "right hand" virtually since the beginning. Brad wrote the first By-Laws, the internal Code of Conduct, ensured (later) that our conferences ran smoother, and served essentially as our first administrative person — all on a volunteer basis while running a very successful PI business in CA.

By 1990 our membership was about 200, the Supplemental Support List was well established and the D List (corporate security directors and individuals by similar titles and functions) had been created. All were considered members. 1990 was also the year of our first conference. Initially called Regional Conferences 53 members and spouses attended this first gathering, held in the Poconos. Although a full member attendance list is not available, members from MD, VA, DE, PA, NJ, NY, CT and MA attended. As long time, now retired member Denny Crowley noted in a 2003 AFOSISA Global Alliance (newsletter) it was not called the first since we did not know whether there would be a second. This was the second feature article on Intelnet to appear in the Association of Former AFOSI Special Agents (AFOSISA) newsletter. Some of purposes outlined in the first article published in April 1986 which remain current today include:

- "Professional and timely investigative support
- Access to open sources to obtain public records
- Specialized investigative assistance in areas of tech security, forensics, polygraph, expert witness, foreign language
- An exchange of ideas regarding business related to "selling" techniques, business development and marketing strategies
- Identification of potential markets and business opportunities
- A quick offering of advice when one has an investigative or security requirement where one may not be completely familiar with
- Assistance from those experienced in the preparation of proposals for investigative/security business opportunities and in responding to requests for bid specifications for prospective business"

Thus, in 7 short years Intelnet grew from an idea emanating from a failed bid to provide investigative services in a background investigation contract to a global network of 200 or so members located in most US states and many key locations globally.

AN INCOMPLETE HISTORY OF INTELLENET (PART II)

THE MIDDLE YEARS

By 1990 we had several successes. Our foremost, of course, was our birth and early growth, ideas and plans for the future. But also established was our first Board of Directors circa 1986 along with preparation of a code of conduct and concept for future development. The initial Board consisted of a representative from each of the six regions that were established in the US, and at least one each from Europe, Africa, Central/South America and Asia. It is believed the first Board had 15 members. No record exists identifying those selected. Memory recalls Brad Penny (d. 2009), Bob Goodman (d. 1995), Tom Hampson, Bill Parker (d. 2019), Fred Bornhofen (d. 2019), Tom Crowley (d. 2013) and Bill Cramer (d. 2006). A special mention about Bill who eventually retired as a Colonel/PhD (and an OSI special agent). Bill was a B-17 pilot. He wrote a book sub-titled: "A Teenage Warrior in World War II". He flew 38 combat missions. He was shot down five times, wounded twice and was a POW escapee, not yet age 19, before he was old enough to vote or buy an alcoholic drink!

Little did we know nor could we predict what the 1990s held not only for Intellenet but also for the private investigative profession: What, if anything would follow our 1990 conference?; What, if any legislation would affect our profession and would impact directly on Intellenet?; Would our growth and development continue in a positive manner?

CONFERENCE

Our first two, the Pocono's (hosted by Jim Carino) Keystone Resorts, Co. (hosted by Greg Caldwell) were billed as Regionals as the idea was to hold conferences in the six regions on a recurring basis. However, Keystone Resorts (nestled high in the Rockies) drew more out of area than "local". It was decided to drop the word Regional. The 1992 conference (return in 1998) was held at the Cheeka Lodge, Islamorada (hosted by Bill Parker). Both were his successes (at the 1998 gathering Charlie Perkins (d. 2005) arranged our Saturday attendance day to be declared Bill Parker Day in Islamorada). The 1993 affair was the first to address special excursions for spouses as well as group outings. 1993 brought us to the west coast city of Santa Barbara (hosted by Brad & Mary Penny). Our first excursion outside the US brought us to Amsterdam Holland (hosted by Gerd and Ruth Hoffman). This conference brought us to a new level of presentations and activities. The latter included a dinner hour gondola city canal tour with hors' d'oeuvres and cocktails, a bus tour visit of the Hague followed by cocktails with a calliope performing outside a world war famous hotel overlooking North Sea. Noted early on was the Hoffman flag flying next to the Dutch flag atop our hotel. The final day coincided with Jim Carino's birthday with two million (as in 2,000,000) turning out to celebrate. Some thought it might have been for Queen Beatrice who was also celebrating a birthday the same day. The next year brought us to

Philadelphia for the first time. It was the first conference to top 100 in attendance. Orca Island followed (hosted by Gary Brown). A whale watching (orca whales of course) excursion thrilled all. A highlight was the young daughter of an attendee (name not recalled) who befriended a deer who followed her constantly. Tunbridge Wells (hosted by Geoff and Maureen Hughes) was our second outing to Europe. Highlights included dinner on the (faux) Orient Express and Geoff shackled in a public square display, looking very forlorn. A special spousal tour included Anne Bolyn's Castle. The 1990s decade conference program concluded in Tucson (hosted by Bert Fulbaum). This was our first (and last) try at vendors invited to conferences until recently successfully re-established. Basically, it was determined we could not develop a solid base to follow on our international overseas ventures.

LEGISLATION

Prior to the decade Congress had passed the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) in 1966, basically establishing the right to access information from the federal government and the Right to Privacy Act in 1974, protecting citizens against invasion of personal privacy through misuse of information. The former had virtually no impact on the private sector and the latter had at best lackluster enforcement with the regard to private investigators. However, that was to abruptly change following the murders of Rebecca Schaeffer (1991) and Amy Boyer (1999). While the Boyer case did not lead to any adverse federal legislation an significant outcome of the Schaeffer case was passage of the Driver Privacy Protection Act (1994) which governs the privacy and disclosure of personal information by state Departments of Motor Vehicles from improper use or disclosure. A third murder, that of William Berkenheiser in PA in 2005 did not produce any adverse legislation as Intellenet members in PA & PALI members successfully precluded.

The Fair Credit Reporting Act (FCRA) initially passed in 1970 also began to be rigorously enforced during the 1990s. The Vail Letter of 1999 led to PIs be required to being compliant with the FCRA.

The 1991 attack on Nancy Kerrigan resulted in no adverse legislation but did not have an impact on Intellenet. Prior to that incident Intellenet policy was to accept any individual recommended by a member. When evidence developed the prime organizer turned out to be an Intellenet member a backburner project to initiate a screening program moved to front and center. It included the requirement for a minimum of 5 years investigative experience (later increased to 10 years. Move on that later). Of course the perpetrator became an immediate ex-member. Fortunately, there was no adverse news media against Intellenet as we were never mentioned in any of the news media coverage

But perhaps the biggest impact on PIs including many of our members was the Y2K mania. Many businesses were concerned that the computers would crash at the turn of the century. To safeguard and upgrade required the expenditure of many dollars. Funds had to found and many companies directed the discretionary funds set aside for investigations to Y2K protection. Unfortunately, many companies did not return those discretionary funds for investigations and many former clients stayed as former. Their mini recession of 2001 had a further negative impact before the big recession of 2007. More on that later.

GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT

Membership continued to expand gradually all through the decade of the 1990s but it was not until 1999 that our first listserv was established. Communication through the decade, thus, was virtually exclusively by Quarterly Newsletters (accompanied by rosters) and telephone with occasional faxes on a one-on-one basis. The listserv essentially eliminated the need for expensive mailouts. Members were being listed on the website and the listserv negated the need at the time for Newsletters which were primarily disseminating information and policy / procedure needs.

Early on in the decade we got our first initiative (we did not call it that back then) when member Joe Malley was successful in being approved by the Resolution Trust Corporation (RTC) as an official investigative entity to investigate the failed Savings and Loans banks. This only had applicability in the US and of course, only Intellenet members were used in those many contracts. Malley was one of the winning bidders. One highlight stands out- at a Louisiana bidder conference Intellenet member (since retired) tal, white haired l T. P. Kelley who was retired FBI and retired local Sheriff arrived a bit late and one of the RTC evaluators exclaimed on T.P's arrival "Holy Mackerel, God just arrived". Intellenet quickly got that project.

Later in the decade Intellenet (still Intelnet until 2007) linked up with Jim Ross' Surveillance Expo, exhibiting for several years in the Washington DC area. On one occasion I was seated on the dais

with G Gordon Liddy – the featured speaker, to my immediate left. I think we had a great conversation but in retrospect I had no idea what he was talking about. This 3-4 year Surveillance Expo run was a successful membership recruiting vehicle, including members for our Supplemental Support List and Security Directors Listserv.

A highlight this decade was formalizing (finally) Intellenet as a legal entity, filing as a Sub-Chapter "S" association in 1996. This was after the IRS declined to accept our petition as a non-profit. Basically, the (un)law firm of Carino and Goodman failed to convince the IRS we were a non-profit.

AN INCOMPLETE HISTORY OF INTELLENET (PART III)

THE MATURING YEARS

December 31, 1999 was perhaps the most traumatic New Year's Eve in recorded history as all eyes were on Y2K and whether all computers would crash. Alas, nothing happened. The big hype panicking much of business and industry turned out to be a big dud. It did have a slight impact on PIs, however, as many business clients diverted investigative dollars to protecting their computer systems. While there was an impact on state association memberships, Intelnet (as we were known then) suffered no ill effects. Within a year, however, another mini problem struck our profession with the 2001 mini recession.

The now veteran Intellenet Board was primed to address business opportunities for members and continue our worldwide growth. The vision of a true worldwide investigative association came to full fruition. Our list-serves established in 1999 provided virtually instantaneous transmission of requests for investigative assistance, sharing business development of ideas and investigative techniques, and problem resolution.

We did not yet know that the Intel Corporation would take exception to our name Intelnet as a trademark infringement. More on that later.

CONFERENCES

The new Century looked off with yet another outside the US site as Louis Laframboise hosted us at Mt. Tremblant exposing us to the French Canadian world. The next conference was in Florence Italy. To help set that up Hava and Jerry Levy, Connie and Jim Carino flew to Florence at personal expense. Geoff Hughes also popped in from England. Conference host Armando Starole and conference planner Sandra Logane (a personal and professional friend of Monica Huss, wife of member Steve) to set one of the more memorable conferences. A total of 63 attended with about 25 spouses joining the attendees. While we tried, we did prove it is not possible to consume all the wine in Tuscany. The Banfi Winery tried to cooperate by offering much of their product through a tour, wine tasting at their museum, and five wines to match the five-course dinner in their castle.

Subsequent conferences in San Francisco (with a visit to the Coppola winery); the Cayman Islands (where we swam with the sting rays and set an unbeatable consumption record at their poolside bar). One other highlight is the most famous photo in Intellenet history — the bobbing heads of fully clothed Jerry Adams and Maureen Hughes in the pool. Only Jerry and Maureen know for sure how that happened! The 2004 Boston conference, hosted by Denny Crowley (the Elder), the big highlight (among many) was the closing Gala at the JFK Library which was exclusively ours for the evening. The following year brought us back to England, this time to Arundel and again hosted by Geoff Hughes. Many of us stood at the exact point where Admiral Nelson last stood but we had an advantage we survived. The year 2006 had us return to Canada making our way west and to Calgary, hosted by Kevin Ripa. Highlights included lunch at Lake Louise and a rodeo. Many enjoyed the Great Rocky Mountain Train ride (to or from) Vancouver as part of this journey. Next was a return to Italy, this time to Sorento for the 25-50-75 (Intellenet's anniversary, Jim and Connie's anniversary and Jim's birthday) as the theme. Many coasted Rome where some yours were set up before heading south by charter bus. Highlights included a tour and security briefing at Pompei and a hydra plane visit to Capri. The following year brought us to the fabulous beaches of Honolulu. Hosted by Joe Cahejos a highlight was a tour and briefing of the POW-MIA facility at Hickam AFB. The decade concluded with the 2010 conference in New Orleans, hosted by Buddy Bomibet (d. 2020). Binet's and Bourbon Street says it all. Attendees included three guys named Peter Psarouthakis, Ed Spicer and Jeff Stein attending their first conference. Washington DC, hosted by Nicole Bocra followed. Tours of the nations Capitol highlighted the social aspects of this conference. Vancouver, Canada was next, again hosted by Kevin Ripa. A highlight was the Rocky Mountain Train Ride to Whistler, lunch and a tour at this prior Olympic site. The year 2013 gave two conferences, first a gathering of most of our members based in Asia and hosted by Jeff Williams and the annual in Philadelphia, hosted by Joanne Dougherty. This was a memorable one – a tour, dinner, gala and exclusive use of the Constitution Center. It also marked the stepping down of Jim Carino as Executive Director after a 30 year reign. This was accomplished as a result of the succession planning committee put together by Jim and courtesy of Dennis Crowley (the Elder) as Chair, Bill Blake, Rob Dudash, Peter Psarouthakis and Sandra Stibbards. Peter was named as Jim's successor and took the helm at the end of this conference.

One final note on conferences. Not to be treated lightly were the outstanding presentations at each. Also during this decade was the establishment of pre-conference prior Day Training, a concept first established by Intellenet and now a staple copied by many other associations. Also noted in the Intellenet archives was a letter of welcome from Congressman Pete Sessions of Texas for the Austin conference, Rep. Sessions was a leader in Congress in introducing legislation favorable to and needed by PIs, most notably the 2004 removal of the heinous conditions set forth in a 1999 revision of the FCRA kudos to member Bill Asher got arranging this.

LEGISLATION

While Congressional, FTC (FCRA), and other government legislation, Acts, etc. had varying degrees of negative impact during this period, none was devastating to the investigative professional. In Pennsylvania in 2005 on Easter Sunday William Berkeyheimer was shot and killed as he responded to a doorbell ring. The assailant had obtained his home address through a PI firm who ran a database check for his address for the assailant. A couple of Intellenet members (Jimmy Mesis and Jim Carino) were requested by the attorney for the widow to assist in the civil suit filed against the PI firm and assailant. More important for the investigative community was Intellenet/PALI members' success ensuring no adverse legislation was passed as in the Rebecca Schaeffer and Amy Boyer cases. The Berkeyheimer assailant was identified and pled guilty to first degree murder and sentenced to life imprisonment.

The civil matter which did impact on Intellenet was the purported trademark infringement case brought by the Intel Corporation. With the assistance of Jim West, our Legal Counsel (Jim was a former US Attorney serving for 8 years in Harrisburg and Pittsburgh), we pled our case. Finally, in 2006 Intellenet agreed to mediation as a way to resolve and yet to be officially filed civil complaint. The Arbitrator ruled in favor of Intel, citing a piece of recently passed trademark legislation favorable to the Intel Corporation. The settlement gave us 9 months to comply with the terms. The Intel Corporation interposed no objection to the name change to Intellenet. In fact Intel suggested it as an acceptable name—a name change that became official in June 2007, Members Fred Bornhofen and Dennis Crowley (the Elder) represented us along with Attorney Jim West.

GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT

Membership continued to expand an evolutionary basis from around 300 in the year 2000 to approximately 450-475 on the investigative roster by 2013. Added to this our Supplemental Support List (SSL) and D-List members brought our total member close to 600. Noted in the files was a comment that in the year 2000 we had 65 members who did not yet use email. Throughout attrition and education we finally had all members on the Listserv by 2005.

Also in 2000 we discovered Peggy Centonze. Peggy was initially retained as a sub-contractor to handle our internet/Listserv of all matters. In 2005 we further expanded her duties by naming her (our first) Executive Secretary later changed to her current title of Executive Assistant. In sum Peggy has become an extremely important member of the Intellenet family.

Intellenet first exhibited with Jim Ross' surveillance Expo Company, from about 1992 – 2002. In 1999 Ross teamed with Northeastern University (Boston) to hold his conference. Just prior Reggie Montgomery, President of the New Jersey PI Association (NJLPIA) and Jim Carino representing PALI began talks on a joint PALI-NJLPIA conference. Others attending the Boston conference from MA and other New England states got wind of this and joined in. Thus was born the first Northeast Super- conference held in Atlantic City in 2000. It was such a success that a followup was held in 2002 and then again one in 2013, this latter one hosted by Jimmie Mesis and PI Magazine. Intellenet exhibited at the 2013 conference

Intellenet also began hold cocktail mixers at ASIS annual seminars during this period ending in about 2010 as member attendance at ASIS annual seminars began to wane. Several still existing SSL and D List members were recruited as well as a good number of present (some now retired) investigative members.

In year 2010 we started a very successful recruitment effort at IAAR Conferences (re-named ACFCS in 2012). Its chief, Charlie Intriago not only comped us in as Exhibitors but also always gave us a great location. He also utilized several of our talented members including Bryan Ingram (TX) and Kevin Ripa (Canada) on computer forensics during the IAAR years and then Sandra Stibbards (CA) as the Headline Speaker on Open Source Intelligence at the 203-2015 conferences. This run ended with the sale of ACFCS by Charlie.

Throughout this period (2000-2013) we also exhibited at several state association conferences to include TALI, PALI and FAPI as well as the Philadelphia Bar Association in concert with PALI, the National Federation of Paralegals Associations (NFPA) and the NACDL. These later three met with little success. To this day, Intellenet remains supportive of any state association requesting our support and interface and in recent years has branched out further in exhibiting. Basically, conference exhibiting was by and large another first for Intellenet, now being d by others.

Readt-Response. The brainchild of member Kevin McClain (IL), this major initiative has now been fully developed and tested. A member needs to make intentions to participate known to Kevin due to its complex nature but no interested members will be denied. Initially, the initiative is primarily designed for US members but the expectation is it will become worldwide in the not too distance future.

In sum, the concept of initiatives is an integral part of the Intellenet vision — to be investigative arm for private sector clients. This, of course, increases billable time for our members. The developmental means for initiatives is simple. Many of our members are competent to conduct but may not be competitive to land a regional, national or international contract. By having the entire force of Intellenet membership strategically located in all corners of the world a competent member can become competitive. If you suddenly stop receiving Intellenet-L listserv messages, please double check your email program including your spam/junk folder to see if you've received a notification that your email account has been unsubscribed from the group.

Thankfully, groups.io has a process in place to easily resubscribe. Whenever an email is unsubscribed from the group, an email message is automatically sent to the affected email address notifying the list member that they have been unsubscribed and provides instructions on how to resubscribe.



It never fails to amaze me how much one can learn by taking a little time to study history. It is humbling, at least to me, to recognize the Gods and Goddesses of an Industry we currently have, and have had in our ranks of INTELLENET.


To all of you who are part of INTELLENT, I salute you. I am honored to be a member and to play, albeit, a small part in documenting the history for future generations.
